Borough auctioning historic dwelling

MADISON — Wanted: Prospective home buyers, looking for true old-world charm. Must be under 6 feet tall.

The Luke Miller House — an 18th-century abode on Ridgedale Avenue that narrowly escaped the bulldozer — is now up for sale. And the borough, which swooped in last year and bought the endangered piece of real estate for \$1.2 million, has taken measures to protect it before selling it back to a private owner.

The borough has placed a conservation easement on the circa-1730, three-story house, ensuring it won't ever be altered or torn down. It's the oldest structure in the borough, said John Solu, chairman of the Madison Historic Preservation Commission.

"It will be a special person who wants to live in this house," Solu said. "It will be somebody who has a vested interest in this community."

The entire Luke Miller property covers 1.6 acres. In an unusual arrangement, the borough is selling only the house and a roughly 30-foot area surrounding it — in total, about four-tenths of acre.

The town will retain ownership of the rest of the site, which has been designated

3 arrested in string of Morristown burglaries

Hispanic residents targeted; police reaching out to find others in town who may have been victimized

MORRISTOWN — Police arrested three men in a string of burglaries that targeted Hispanic residents within the last month. Elvin Villatoro, 28, Jose Ivan Torres, and Noel Morreno, 18, all of Morristown were each charged with burglary, theft conspiracy to commit burglaries. Torres was also charged with false identification and hindering apprehension.

Villatoro and Morreno were taken to Morris County jail on \$50,000 bail. Torres was being held at the county jail on \$75,000 because of the additional charges.

In the last month, police have investigated burglaries of the homes of 20 to 30 victims with Hispanic surnames, said Lt. James Wilcox. The burglaries, which also included some cars, were scattered throughout town.

Wilcox said that they believe more victims exist, but have hesitated to come forward.

"We believe there might be some people who didn't call us because of their immigration status," Wilcox said.

"Their immigration status is not our concern," Wilcox said. "Our concern is the crime itself."

The most recent burglaries occurred at Atno Avenue and Vail Place.

About \$1,100 worth of items, including a necklace, a camera, a mountain bike and some cash were taken from an apartment at 23 Atno Ave. between 9 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. Sept. 20, police said.

The apartment at Vail Place was burglarized twice, first on Sept. 1, when burglars stole \$2,790 in jewelry, and again this week when burglars stole \$430 in items.

In each of the burglaries, the thief broke through the front door, police said.

Firefighters assist with Katrina relief

Morris Twp. crew returns after setting up decontamination center. Comparisons made to Sept. 11

Six members of the Morris Township Fire Department traveled to Baton Rouge to assist with decontamination efforts and return earlier this week with a new look at the issues facing the Gulf Coast region.

"Our main job was to give support to local Louisiana law enforcement agencies," Deputy Chief Scott J. Lovernberg said. "When the guys came back from working, we would help make sure they were decontaminated."

The six-member squad, the Morris County Decontamination Unit of the Morris Township Fire Department, traveled around Louisiana for 13 days setting up large white and yellow tents equipped with bleach and water. Relief workers and law enforcement were able to scrub their boots, wash their clothes or, if it was necessary, decontaminate their entire bodies. "Full-body decontamination was used on people who fell down into an infected substance that might have contained bacteria."

Turf tab at Morristown: \$928,000

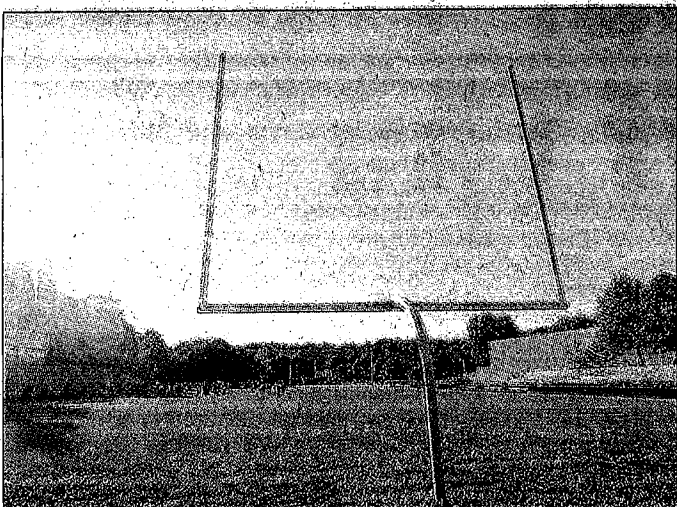
School district weighs replacing football field grass at high school

MORRISTOWN — The school board wants to spend more than \$900,000 of local and state dollars to replace the high school football field grass with artificial turf.

The board envisions an artificial turf field used to host the athletic activities played on the fields at Frelinghuysen Middle School and the Harter Road annex while those fields' natural grass grows back.

The Frelinghuysen and Harter Road fields have been worn thin from constant use by school and community ath-

grass turf, based on district salary and maintenance records, is \$19,000, though the industry average is \$33,000, said Mary Donohoethe district's community relations representative.

The cost to maintain artificial turf, however, would be \$4,000.

The cost of installing the turf would be \$928,000, \$176,000 of which would be paid for by the state Department of Education through the Schools Construction
